- Benefits of peer mentoring
  - Assists new students in making a successful transition
  - Facilitates connections and friendships
  - Builds a sense of community
  - Introduces mentees to campus services and resources
  - Mutual benefits for participants

  - By similar interest (major) or home country

Organizational Collaboration

Collaborating with the DEI specialists in your organization is an important way to prioritize this in your inclusive programming

- Build a strong relationship between the DEI specialists/office and your unit
- Partner on training programs
- Leverage available resources and provide feedback on how to make them more inclusive for your student population
